10. The dramatic purpose of Hamlet's soliloquies.
11. The appropriateness of the Biblical analogy used in "Mac Flecknoe".

13. The epitaph in Gray's *Elegy*.
14. Picaresque elements in *Tom Jones*.

Section A

21. Comment on Chaucer's portrayal of women in the Prologue.
22. Comment on the view of "Mac Flecknoe" as a poem that is the triumph of genius as distinguished from mere talent.
23. Attempt a critical analysis of "Elegy written in a country churchyard".

Section B

24. Attempt a psycho analytical study of Hamlet's character.
25. Do you think that the fifth Act of *The Duchess of Malfi* is superfluous? Elucidate.
26. How far do you agree with the critical remark that *The School for Scandal* is perhaps the most finished and faultless comedy of the time of its publication.

Section C

27. Evaluate *Tom Jones* as one of the great fictional comedies of western literature.
28. Discuss the statement that Swift utilizes new scientific knowledge of his day without permitting it to unsettle his moral vision.
29. Attempt an assessment of the prescribed essays of Bacon as realistic, epigrammatic dissertations based on his observations.

Section D

30. Comment on Swift's use of fantasy in *Gulliver's Travels*.
31. Make a comparative analysis of Pope and Dryden as satirists on the basis of their poems prescribed for study.
32. Attempt a critical evaluation of *Hamlet* and *The Duchess of Malfi* as Revenge plays bringing out the differences in treatment.
